To the citizens of Knox County,

On behalf of our officers and staff, I would like to thank you for your support this past year. This report contains statistical information, activity, and notable accomplishments relating to the Knox County Sheriff's Office for 2022.

We welcomed eight new employees to the agency in 2022. Five of them had prior law enforcement experience, and three were new to the profession. Four employees left to pursue other careers, and one transferred to another law enforcement agency.

Ohio mandated twenty-four hours of continuing professional training for all certified peace officers. All of our certified deputies completed at least thirty-two hours of training. Mandated training topics included diversity, inclusion, equity, responding to mental health calls, use of force, legal updates, officer personal wellness, responding to sexual assaults, and domestic violence. This is in addition to firearms proficiency and *Taser* training.

Plans for 2023 include a mental wellness check in program for all of our employees. We have also begun the process of a jail modification that will allow more space for female inmates.


SHERIFF

Sheriff David Shaffer was first elected as the Sheriff of Knox County in 2012. He was re-elected in 2016, and again in 2020. He has 29 years of service with the agency, and 35 years of full-time law enforcement experience. He is an active member of the Buckeye State Sheriff's Association and serves on the board of directors as a district representative. He serves on the legislative, community corrections, and court security committees. He has received the designation of Certified Law Enforcement Manager from the Buckeye State Sheriff's Association's Accreditation Program for the past ten years. He also is an associate member of the Knox County Township Trustee's Association. Sheriff Shaffer serves on the executive board of the Knox Substance Abuse Action Team and is involved with the Crisis Intervention Team Steering Committee, Suicide Prevention Coalition, and several other local groups.



CAPTAIN

Captain Jay Sheffer is second in command of the agency and part of the administrative staff. He has over 27 years of full time law enforcement experience. His duties include coordinating training, preparing and overseeing grant proposals, equipment acquisitions, information releases, public relations, and assisting in personnel and labor contract issues. He is a certified firearms and TASER instructor. He is also an Ohio peace officer academy instructor. Capt. Sheffer is an active participant with the Knox County Domestic Violence Collaborative, Safe Communities Coalition, and Project Lifesaver. He serves as a member of the Knox County Board of Developmental Disabilities. Capt. Sheffer is an ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) instructor. He has helped provide safety and security training to numerous county schools, government offices, churches and organizations.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

The Knox County Sheriff's Office has three school resource officers working in Knox County Schools. Deputy Annette Mercer works in the Centerburg School District. Deputy Mike Collins and Josh Jones are assigned to the East Knox School District. These deputies work in the schools full time, instructing, mentoring, and interacting with students. They work to build positive relationships with both students and school staff and provide an important added layer of security. They assist with patrol operations when school is not in session.

MARINE PATROL

The Knox County Sheriff's Office receives funding assistance from the Ohio Division of Watercraft to operate and maintain a part-time Marine Patrol Unit. The unit conducts patrol, enforcement and educational activities on the 1400 acres of waterways in Knox County. Apple Valley also pays for additional patrol hours that are focused on Apple Valley Lake.

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CENTRAL OHIO DRUG ENFORCEMENT TASK FORCE

The Knox County Sheriff's Office is an active member of the Central Ohio Drug Enforcement Task Force (CODETF). The task force is comprised of agencies from Coshocton, Guernsey, Knox, Licking, Muskingum and Perry Counties. These agencies include sheriffs' offices, prosecutors' offices and police departments. The mission of the task force is to provide professional investigative and technical resources, with an emphasis on narcotics, vice and organized crime investigations to the enforcement agencies and citizens throughout our region.

JAIL DIVISION

The Knox County Sheriff's Office operates a full service jail that houses several classes of inmates: Those who are awaiting trial on either misdemeanor or felony charges, those who have been sentenced on either misdemeanor or certain felony charges, and those who have been sentenced on felony charges and are awaiting transport to prison. The Knox County Sheriff's Office also has a contract with the U.S. Marshal's Service for housing federally charged inmates.

Facilities at the Knox County Jail are inspected regularly by the Knox County Health Department and the Mount Vernon Fire Department. In addition, the jail is inspected and certified annually by the State of Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections. In 2022 the jail was in compliance with 175 standards, (53 Essential, and 122 Important). The jail is in compliance with 100% of the Essential Standards and at least 90% of the Important Standards.

MEDICAL STAFF

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code 2929.37 & 2929.38, the Knox County Jail has established a reimbursement program for convicted inmates. Any prisoner who has been <u>convicted</u> of an offense is required to pay all or part of the costs of confinement.

All sentenced inmates booked into and released from the Knox County Jail are assessed an inmate processing fee (IPF) of \$20.00 to assist in defraying the cost of intake processing and release. The fee is deducted from the inmate's commissary account.

JAIL SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS

Video Visitation

The Knox County Jail utilizes a video visitation feature that allows inmates to visit more often with family and friends. Visitors can participate from a video screen located in the lobby, or use a computer or cell phone from any location.

Mail Scanning

A mail scanning system has been implemented to reduce contraband. Mail that is sent to inmates goes to a location that scans and uploads all mail to an inmate account that is viewable in each dorm.

SPECIAL INMATE SERVICES

Freedom Center

Substance abuse counselling services are provided for inmates. A full-time staff member from the Freedom Center provides assessments, individual and group counseling, as well as support services.

Behavioral Health Partnership

Mental health assessments and counseling services are provided to the inmates. Behavioral Health Partnership staff averages approximately 40 hours per week at the jail. They also assist with arrangements for housing, medical, and counseling assistance after release.

Health & Human Services Administration (HRSA): Rural Communities Opioid Response Program Grant

The Knox County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Freedom Center, Mental Health & Recovery for Licking & Knox County, along with other community agencies and organizations have been awarded a three year grant to expand substance abuse education and treatment. Knox County Jail inmates who qualify, are eligible to participate in the program.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

Jan Wasiluk: Her duties include budget preparations, preparing and analyzing agency billings and accounts. Maintaining records of agency financial transactions. Maintaining personnel documents, processing payroll, scheduling, and all other duties required of an administrative assistant.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Jarrod Laslo: Jarrod is an I.T. Technician for Knox County and assists part time at the Knox County Sheriff's Office. His duties include maintaining and servicing the office and mobile computers, network systems, software, and storage devices

FRONT DESK ASSISTANT

Jill Wells: Her duties include answering phone calls, assisting with walk in visitors, processing concealed carry weapon permits and background checks. Jill also assists with processing public records requests.

EVIDENCE MANAGEMENT

Michael Glaser: His responsibilities include recording, sorting, storing, and returning evidence in accordance with procedures established by the Ohio Revised Code and the Knox County Sheriff's Office.

BACKGROUND CHECK PROCESSOR

Grant Lyons: His duties include fingerprinting civilians for concealed carry permits and employment background checks. He assists in scheduling inmate transports and sex offender registrations. He also assists with front desk duties.

CIVIL PROCESS DIVISION

COURT SECURITY AND INMATE TRANSPORTS

This year we assigned four deputies from the Jail Division to be responsible for security at the Knox County Common Pleas Court and adjacent county office buildings. They also perform inmate transports to and from hospitals, treatment facilities, other county jails and prison facilities.

CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

Deputy Chad Kennedy and Deputy Kyle Johnson In 2015, the Knox County Sheriff's Office entered into a contract with the Knox County Child Support Enforcement Agency (CSEA) to provide additional services for their agency. As part of the agreement, the county receives a reimbursement from the State of Ohio on a portion of the officer's wages, equipment, and expenses. The two deputies are responsible for the serving of summons, subpoenas, and notices of hearings. They also work to locate individuals with outstanding warrants and manage the SEEK WORK PROGRAM. Officers meet with participants in the program on a regular basis to verify that they are actively seeking employment. Participants are also required to provide documentation verifying their activity.

RECORDS CLERK

Karen Hall: Her duties include processing subpoenas, warrants and all other documents issued by local, out of county, and out of state courts. Filing and maintaining all reports and case files. Processing public records requests and background requests.

She also assists with processing background checks, court documents, electronic fingerprinting, billing, concealed carry weapons permits and staffing the lobby office for public walk-ins.

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATIONS

The Knox County Sheriff's Office is responsible for registering all convicted sex offenders who live in Knox County. These registrations are performed by the jail division officers. Patrol officers and detectives do random checks to verify the offenders are actually living at the registered locations. Deputies also investigate any cases of offenders who fail to register.

Citizens are able to search the offender database through the Knox County Sheriff's Office website. They can also sign up to receive email alerts if a registered offender moves to their area.




Sergeant Jesse Ramsier

CONNECTIONS WITH THE COMMUNITY

COMMUNITY SERVICE GROUPS

Representatives from the Knox County Sheriff's Office participate in various groups and organizations. Some of these organizations include the Knox Substance Abuse Action Team, Safe Communities Coalition, Domestic Violence Collaborative, Suicide Prevention Coalition, Child Protection Team, Sexual Assault Response Team, Local Emergency Planning Committee, Healthcare Coalition, Knox County Board of Developmental Disabilities, and Rescue Task Force training, .

COMMUNITY PRESENTATIONS

Officers regularly attend various functions throughout the county to help inform and educate the public on a variety of safety issues. Presentations are made to civic clubs and organizations, scouting groups, schools, universities, church groups, businesses, and neighborhood watch groups. Several officers are trained instructors in the ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) program.

CRIME TIP LINE NUMBER

Citizens are encouraged to use the confidential tip line to leave information on suspected criminal activity, including drug activity, burglaries, wanted persons, child and elder abuse, and welfare fraud. The tip line is not for reporting crimes in progress or when an immediate officer response is needed.

The 24 hour tip line is 740-399-3959

DRUG DROP OFF BOX

The Sheriff's Office maintains a secure drop off box where anyone can drop off unused pills for proper disposal. The box is located in the lobby and is available twenty-four hours a day. Persons are asked to remove the pills from their original container and place them into a clear plastic bag. The bag can then be deposited into the drop box. In 2022, **327.78** pounds of pills were collected for destruction.

PORTABLE DRUG INCINERATOR



To help dispose of the large amount of medications that are collected in the drop box, we began using a portable incinerator. The device is also used to dispose of illegal drugs that are no longer needed for evidence.

KNOX COUNTY ALERTS

Residents may sign up for free email and text alert messages. This service enables citizens to be informed of road closures, emergency notifications, and weather alerts. Users are able to custom select the types of notifications they wish to receive. Citizens can sign up for alerts by going to the website below.



PROJECT LIFESAVER

PROJECT LIFESAVER aids caregivers and families of persons suffering from Alzheimer's, wandering, and other related disorders such as Downs Syndrome and Autism. Clients who are enrolled in PROJECT LIFESAVER wear a wristband that emits a tracking signal 24 hours a day on an individually assigned FM radio frequency. That signal can be tracked on the ground or in the air over several miles, should the client be reported missing. The Knox County Sheriff's Office has joined with the Knox County Health Department, Station Break, Region 5 Area on Aging, Knox County Board of Developmental Disabilities as well as local citizens and groups to provide this service.



How it works

Currently, 1,200 agencies in 45 states participate in the program—police, sheriff, fire, public safety departments and other emergency responders. The method relies on proven radio technology and specially trained search and rescue teams.

Citizens enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small transmitter on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized tracking signal.

If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local Project Lifesaver

agency and a trained emergency team responds to the wanderer's area. Most who wander are found within a few miles from home, with search times reduced from hours and days to minutes. Recovery times for Project Lifesaver clients average 30 minutes

How it can help you

If you have a loved one who is prone to wandering, Knox County Project Lifesaver can **provide them with a transmitter** which will track their whereabouts should they wander away.

It is highly recommended that each participant have a 24-hour caregiver.

The transmitter can be worn on either the ankle or wrist. Each participant receives six bracelets and six batteries, good



for 60 days each - plus a battery tester.



A home health aide with the Knox County Health Department will make arrangements with each family to visit the participant and change the batteries on a regular basis.
